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Pursuant to the reporting requirements of <u>Legislative Bill 1402</u> (2024), my office is submitting the following information regarding Nebraska's education scholarship program, as required by the statute prior to the law's repeal via <u>Referendum Measure 435</u> (2024).

While the statutory mandate for this report was technically removed following the law's repeal, I am providing this data to ensure full transparency and accountability for the public funds utilized during the program's operation.

Historical Context

Enacted by the Legislature in 2024, LB 1402 provided \$10 million annually to fund education scholarships to pay all or part of the cost to educate eligible students attending non-governmental, privately operated elementary and secondary schools in Nebraska. Ultimately, the scholarship program created by the enacted bill was repealed in November 2024 by Nebraska voters through Referendum Measure 435.

Policies and Procedures for Awarding Scholarships

Under LB 1402, the State Treasurer established a private school scholarship program that prioritized existing recipients from the Opportunity Scholarships Act and their siblings. Following this initial priority, scholarships were awarded based on a tiered system that accounted for household income levels and specific student needs.

Priority was subsequently granted to students from households at or below 185% of the federal poverty level (FPL), as well as students in specific circumstances, such as those with individualized education programs, those experiencing bullying, children in foster care, or students from military families.

Lower priority tiers extended eligibility to students from households with incomes up to 213% of the FPL and up to 300% of the income limit for the federal reduced-price meal program.

To ensure fiscal responsibility and broad access, individual scholarships could not exceed the actual cost of education at the student's chosen school. The average of all awards was required to remain at or below 75% of the statewide average general fund operating expenditures per student.

 - 126 due to enrollment status listed as "closed" or "denied."
 - > 893 due to being not qualified under the statutory guidelines.
